Timeline of Madison County and the Pond



White Oak Pond Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) Richmond, Kentucky

1784	David Gass and Samuel Estill start the Milford settlement. "Milford" named after Captain John Kincaid's freed African slave. Kincaid from a town in Ireland named "Milford."
1785	The Log Meeting House built as Regular Baptist, the Meeting House of the Milford settlement. John Tanner was the pastor of the church.
1785-86	Madison County is organized by Virginia Governor Patrick Henry at Williainsburg; Milford is chosen as the county seat. Boonesborough loses its chance as county seat. George Adams disagrees with the decision, but holds the first court meeting in his log house.
1788	A Stone Court House built at Milford at a cost of 880 Ibs. of tobacco. Town is surveyed by James French. In winter, "Black Bob Morgan's Gang" killed by the people of Milford.
1790	The Log Meeting House changed its name to White Oak Baptist Church.
1792	Kentucky leaves Virginia and becomes a State.
1798	July 4, The County Seat moved to John Miller's farm; Miller donates two acres of land and a log house. Milford residents charge against the change: "the first rebellion against the laws and constituted authority of the Commonwealth of Kentucky."
1799	In Spring, the old road to Milford ordered closed.
1801	Pastor Andrew Tribble constitutes the White Oak Baptist Church and changes its name to White Oak <i>Pond</i> Church.
1802	White Oak Pond Church joins the Tates Creek Baptist Association.
1811	Joseph R. Pond performs marriages.
1827	First County Temperance Society held at White Oak Pond. Nancy Irvine became "the first woman to talk for women in Kentucky and perhaps America" at White Oak Pond.
1830	David Chenault takes the pastorate.
1830	June 11, at Viney Fork Church, White Oak Pond left the Baptists to embrace the Reformation ideas of Alexander Campbell.
1831	Moses Willis, ordained preacher.

1832	Campbell and Stone movement unite creating the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ).
1845	John R. White, pastor
1849	J.R. Pond makes charges against J.R. White in a handbill. J.R. Pond cut off from the Baptists, charged with heresy.
1852	Harriett Beecher Stowe publishes her abolitionist book, "Uncle Tom's Cabin" based on the Kennedy family in Paintlick, Nephew of the Sheriff of Milford.
1862	John Griffith Pond, Captain Company A. J. T. Pond, Corporal Company A, killed
1869	The old log church was taken down and a "Monk Bond" Brick church, facing south, was built. Cost is \$2,450.00
1976	Fulltime ministry is begun: the Rev. James Blair.
1980	June 29, Dedication of the Educational wing.
1989	"Dante's Inferno" Youth Outreach Halloween project begins.
1990	Bieentennial Celebration of WOP
1992	"Pioneer Christmas in Kentucky" written and performed at Fort Boonesborough in commemoration of the 200 Anniversary of Kentucky becoming a State.
2002	"The Baker Addition" built on the site of the old log church.
2011	Rev. Dr. Russell Rechenbach II retires from White Oak Pond Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) after 25 years.
2012	Rev. Seung (Paul) Tche, a native of South Korea, is installed as Senior Pastor.
